

LionRock Farm is a magical setting with the most spectacular and breathtaking views in the Northwest Corner. Remarkable vistas at sunrise and sunset overlook the famous Twin Oaks field and the Taconic mountain range. Named after a large natural rock formation resembling a lion on the grounds, the 600 acre working farm surrounds the gardens, barns and main house. The open

landscape of the farm is well known for its large field of blooming sunflowers in August. The heart of the many gardens that connect the house and farm buildings is the formal parterre garden, beautifully designed with four quadrants filled with perennials around a multi-tiered Victorian water fountain anchored by towering catalpa trees. Allees of maples and an arch of River birch create the architecture and embrace the cluster of barns and gardens that frame the views over the rolling hills. Borders of peonies,

roses and hydrangea are situated among the stone walls with antique statuary and urns of all sizes overflowing with unusual plantings, offering the loveliest outdoor rooms in which to sit, dream, get married or have a party.


